
MONTREAL – ATLAS III Wrap Up Session Part 1
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MAUREEN HILYARD: Okay, just attention, everyone. Lunch is ready so what we're going to do is, first of all, welcome. I'm really pleased that you all made it to the very last day. We're into the end of the, or the beginning of the wrap-up session.

The lunch is ready so what I would like you to do is – thank you – okay, what I'd like you to do is to get your lunch and bring it back. Make yourselves comfortable and we'll start with the official proceedings, okay? So please – I don't know how they do it. What do they do?

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: It's hot buffet.

MAUREEN HILYARD: Yeah. It's a hot buffet so just, I don't know where you start. Go at the end and they'll probably direct you somehow. But get your lunch and then back into your seats please and then we can start. Giving out the certificates and all the other things that need to be done. Thank you.

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: For those having lunch, if you could please get your lunch and come back to your seats as we're about to start the session. And if any of today's agenda is unclear, please note that all sessions are to be

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attended so we have this – can you just scroll down please? – we have this session now which is ATLAS III Wrap-Up Session, Part 1. We then go into ATLAS III Wrap-Up Session, Part 2, which will also be part of the At-Large Leadership Wrap-Up. And then after that, we have the last session, which is running from 3:45 to 4:45 which is the At-Large Leadership Session on Post-ATLAS III activities. Again, that concerns everyone so please do stay in this room until quarter to five, just before the public forum and we hope we'll see many of you at the public forum and then after that at the closing cocktail reception so that we can all bid our farewells to each other. Thank you very much.

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: Thank you very much. Yeah, we'll go there. We'll go there.

MAUREEN HILYARD: Thank you. I know that there are still a few people getting their lunch, and if you wouldn't mind, everyone else, because we do have two important people here and they do have other places to go to. So if we can just keep the noise down and I would like to, first of all, introduce you to our new ICANN Board Chair, and of course, our new ICANN Vice Chair whom I have actually just very recently, a few seconds ago, given, presented them with their ATLAS III Ambassador pins, so they are honorary ATLAS III ambassadors. They're one of us. So I would first of all, like to ask Maarten to speak to you.

MAARTEN BOTTERMAN: Okay. Thank you for welcoming me here and thank you for this honor of being an ATLAS III Ambassador. We've been following this and we've been briefed very well on the intense week that you've all had and I've been impressed to hear that already to come here, you've been through courses and things like that to really learn everything there was to learn here.

And actually, I've also benefited from some of the work myself that participate to the ICANN Leadership Academy, Academy Leadership Program which shared some of the lessons that you've been learning here as well.

So a case study approach will really have helped you to dive in deep and understand some of the issues that come in a multistakeholder environment which aren't always easy to solve but they're worth [inaudible] solving and addressing, need to be addressed. You also, it will also be useful to you because the work will continue in EPDP Phase 2 and yet [inaudible] is this one every five year, or every six year opportunity to really come together and get your at-large message sharp and concise to the community. We are looking very much forward in hearing the outcome of your work and we will do that with the respected [inaudible] and we look forward how that will influence our way forward.

So one of the congratulations is to all of you for also becoming ambassador for all of you who completed this course. Really commitment, really appreciate it and welcome aboard.

Next to that, I'm very happy and honored to have next to me my Vice Chair who actually comes from this community. So I'd like to give him the mic to complete this statement. So León?

LEÓN SÁNCHEZ:

Thank you very much, Maarten.

As I always say, it's so good to be home. Thank you for having me again and as you are aware, the Board passed some resolutions on ATLAS III in its meeting earlier today, and for those of you who are not aware of these resolutions, I would like to quickly read them so that you are aware and get a sense of how important ATLAS III is to the Board.

So the first resolution says the Board extends its congratulations on the successful summit held during ICANN 66 in Montreal to ATLAS III. The second resolution is the Board affirms the significance of the ATLAS III meeting and its outcomes as valuable input for the At-Large community of individual Internet users towards strengthening ICANN.

The third resolution is the Board expresses its great appreciation for the tremendous effort made by the At-Large community in delivering the third At-Large Summit and the post-ATLAS III implementation activities.

Finally, the fourth resolution reads, "The Board looks forward to following up with the ALAC on any inputs that are provided to the Board resulting from the third At-Large Summit and post-ATLAS III implementation activities."

As you are aware, probably half of the Board or more members were present during different times in ATLAS. As I said, I didn't come alone. I brought back-up. So many of my colleagues were here because I suggested and I asked them that they join us in this effort and in this work that we are all doing here, in this effort of continuing to build a vibrant community, a diverse community, an inclusive community. So in that sense, now I'm going to turn to Spanish so we foster diversity and inclusiveness.

I would like to echo Maarten's words in the sense that, of the great responsibility that we take on as end users of having users' voices heard in all ICANN forums of carrying this message of advocating the rights of end users and voicing their concerns in all ICANN policies. As members of ATLAS III, as ambassadors of ATLAS III, we take on the responsibility of going back to the places we come from and recruiting more people, having more people join what ICANN is doing in teaching people what things are done and inviting them to join us. There are different programs by which you can become a member. We are discussing [abet] in the meetings between ALAC and the Board. I have invited you to bring ideas and to work together with the organization to see how we can crystallize those ideas so that they can help more people get involved and [inaudible] and removing the participation barriers or hurdles that are in place today.

One of the critical issues we have had in the selection process for ATLAS, we know was granting Visas. At the Board, we are aware of this issue. At the Board, we have taken at least two of the members and I'm sure this is shared with the rest of my colleagues. We have taken, I'm saying, the

personal commitment to help each participant, not only ATLAS but also people from meetings held throughout the year so that Visa issues to be less important because we don't want to have that hurdle anymore.

But let's be understanding and we need to understand as a Board and as an organization, we will not cease in our efforts to make the Visa granting process as easy as possible, but acknowledging that, at the end of the day, the decision is in the hands of the country and that is beyond our control. That is why I would like to ask you for your support, especially for the right of [tension] of the Visas.

A good news item, as I have said in the At-Large chat, those who are here and obtained a Visa for Canada or one for the United States or Japan or the United Kingdom or any [inaudible] area Visa, you don't need a Visa for Mexico. Mexico automatically will let you in if you have a passport of certain nationalities and if you are not part of that, any individual with a Visa from the countries I have just said.

There's more information on this regard and I will forward it to you.

I'm working with the ICANN meeting team, Rodrigo de la Parra, the transport secretary, foreign affairs secretary to Seoul, to make sure that the Visa process for Cancun is as easy and fast as possible and the least stressing as possible for all participants.

I don't want to take anymore of your time. I would like to thank you for your support. The place has invested, has required a lot of toil on my side and your support. The fact that I am a Vice Chair at the Board is an achievement of the At-Large community and it is an achievement that

we need to advocate for and disseminate and reinforce. So thank you very much for all your effort, for all your support, and let's keep on building an inclusive and diverse ICANN. Thank you very much.

MAUREEN HILYARD: Thank you very much, León and Maarten. [Inaudible] the fact that we actually got the recognition within the Board agenda and the resolutions that were made and I'm really looking forward to working with you, and you will hear a lot about ATLAS in the upcoming year anyway. So thank you very much.

[GÖRAN MARBY]: And thank you all. Old friends in this room, many of those, and new friends, really looking forward to working with you as well.

MAUREEN HILYARD: Thank you. Okay.

Okay. Now that formality's over. We're going to the presentations. So I'm going to, we have a system here. It's been devised to make sure that everyone gets their just desserts.

One of the very first things that you will get, of course, is your certificate. There is a certificate of completion or participation depending on what your role was, but especially you will get a pen that actually indicates that you are an ATLAS III Ambassador. This is going to be really important but it also will entail responsibilities. Okay?

So that when you're actually, when you have been given this, there are going to be some expectations and I'll give you the long list in an e-mail. So that you can read it on your way home. You might need to take all that time to read it because it's going to be quite comprehensive.

But what it is, the whole point is that we wanted you to understand what was actually involved in the process of assisting Jonathan and the CPWG and anyone else who's involved in policy development as well as the work that we're going to be doing in outreach and engagement. There's communications. There's capacity building. I understand there's a service security group that could be setting up. There's a lot of work that actually requires active participation and this is the group that is going to be the lead in that. Okay?

We have a lot of other active participants who haven't been able to come to this particular meeting and they will also be like supporters along the way. But I think what you've done here is you've set up a lot of networks. You know that if you have any problems, there are colleagues that you can actually work with. We're always here, the staff, the ALAC members who, the [calendar] ALAC members. We have got some newbies coming on and we're welcoming them as well. So we've got a new family and it's a family I'm really proud to be associated with and I welcome you all into our community.

But okay, see these guys? They're getting themselves all organized. They've all got a role to play up here. So what I'm going to do is I'm going to be calling you up one by one and you will get a photo taken in front of your RALO banner. Then you will collect a gift pack. You'll be

getting your pens, your certificate. Just go to each of these people and they'll give you something.

So let's start. I'll try not to go too fast because the photos might take time and everything. Okay, so the first one is, I think this is all alphabetical order according to your [cushion] name.

So we've got [Abdul Jalil]. Come around here and go in front of your banner so we can get a photo. Oh, he's getting his lunch. It's okay. When he comes up. Yes. Okay. We might, yeah. Your hands are going to get sore at the end of this.

And then we've got, so while this is happening and hopefully the line is actually sort of moving on, we've got Abdulkarim. Abdulkarim? Oh, yeah. Just carry on along the line. Yeah, great.

Abdulkarim is coming up now and then there will be Adrian. No, the other Adrian. Adrian Smith. Sorry, I forgot we had two. This is Adrian Carbello. Sorry. I'm going to have, yeah. Just, yeah. Adrian, yeah. Adrian Smith, you're next. You're next. It's just that, I don't know, that'll be the certificates. No, no. Come up. Yeah.

And then we've got [Asia], [Asia Shakira Suhaidi]. At least you all, if you haven't met these people individually, you'll be able to see them when they get their certificates.

Then there's Alberto Soto. I hope no one's expecting this to be a real formal kind of thing. Okay, that's Alberto.

[Allie] [Alomeshal]. Then Amir, Amir Qayyum. Then Anne-Marie Bachollet. Aris Ignacio. [Abacari] [inaudible], [Abacari]. Bikram Shrestha. Thank you, Bikram. [Bukola Oronti]. [Shakri Ben Rondan]. [Clemmon Jonti]. Daniel Nanghaka. Thank you.

David [Mekhi]. Dev Anand. Diego Alfonso Acosta Bastidas. Gilberto Lara. [Ginela]. And Hernan [inaudible]. [Inis]. Oh, here's one. Joan, Joan [Katambe]. Jose [inaudible] and Justine [Chu]. [Kristina]. Thank you. Lovely to have you.

[Lillian]. Lutz, Lutz Donnerhack. Is he here? Yeah, he is. Lovely day. And Maritza. [Inaudible]. Michelle [inaudible]. Is Michelle here? Let me ju]st see. Thank you. Michelle's not here. No.

Nadira. And Oksana. [Pastor Peters]. Pratik. Priyatosh. Oh, thank you, Oksana. That's lovely of you. [Ramanu Beyal]. [Raymond Mamata]. I'm not forgetting you, Roberto. It's to get [inaudible].

And of course, Shreedeeep. [Shiva]. [Suhaidi]. To complete the [Suhaidi Hassan] family. Vanda. Is Vanda here? Oh, yes. Is [Yesul] here, [Yesul] Kim? No. All righty.

Okay, and now we have the Canadian ALSes who participated. We've got Charles Robert. Is Charles here? Charles, good. Monique [inaudible]. Monique? No. Olivier Bachollet. And Pierre [Jean Davies].

We also had some remote participants and they will get their certificates and participation certificates online. No, sent to them probably. There was Alejandro [Pascente], Antonio Medina Gomez, [inaudible], [Edukeme] [inaudible], ISOC [Maposo Nikemnoeke].

I understand [inaudible] arrived today? Yesterday. But you will get yours. [Inaudible], does he? [Inaudible] late. Will he get a pack? Yeah. Here we go. The fact, well you made it. I think [Vernesius] is the final one of the Visa issue people. And there's also [inaudible].

Okay, so that is the, that's the end of the formality, the presentations. Okay. Yes, if you'd like to just finish your meal. I think, what time do we start for our next?

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: We finish at a quarter past. So do you want them to say anything, if anybody wants to say anything?

MAUREEN HILYARD: Yeah. Okay. Right. We have a wrap-up session at half-past. Okay.

So is there anyone who, now that we've got a bit of spare time and while people are finishing off their meals – and I don't know, there might still be something up there that people might want – is there anyone who actually wants to take the mic? Can I pass the mic to someone else? Oh, I want one of those.

ADRIAN CARBELLO: We should congratulate all the ICANN staff that was here, all the long hours. So good job.

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: Thank you very much, Maureen. So adding on that, I would like not only to thank the ICANN staff but also to thank very, very much ICANN Travel Constituency and ICANN Travel Support who helped us a lot in getting our Visas. Even though it took too much time, but by the end of the day, we're here and we're happy. Thank you very much travel support.

MAUREEN HILYARD: Daniel first.

DANIEL NANGHAKA: Thank you very much, all the participants for ATLAS III, and I would like to appreciate our facilitator, David Kolb. At least, he has done a really great work. And also for the participants who have been able to endure through this training and I would like to add you that this is just the beginning of engagement. And one thing is that in our different, various constituencies, let's not fear to take up leadership roles. Let's not fear to get engaged because we do not have adequate knowledge, but the key to landing is to ask. If you ask and consult, then you'll be able to elevate your skills and know much. So I will [calm] you all and encourage you to participate. There are opportunities that are there. Outreach and Engagement has quite a number of opportunities for you to be able to participate. Social media, capacity building, I cannot name it all.

Then in case you're interested, also there are other different working groups, like which are involved in the policy development like the

CPWG. I cannot mention all right now but I will [calm] you all. Thank you.

ALBERTO SOTO:

Okay, I will speak in Spanish. I would like to thank Maureen and ALAC as a whole for their hard work and I want to tell you to rest assured that we have achieved excellent results. We have achieved excellent results throughout this process, especially through the learning process. I loved to work with young people. I'm not old, but I have just built up youth.

And young people have taught us a lot, have taught a lot of us to those of us who have some built up youth. They are really willing to work and my only message to them would be, participate, get engaged, enroll in a GNSO group. Some people have already told me they [inaudible] participate or choose the subject matter you're interested in so that you don't feel frustrated. Choose a subject matter you like. Participate in the working groups. You will be able to raise your hands. This is the way I did. I raised my hand when I was able to have some knowledge and was ready to share an opinion. But this is a way of joining the groups and start working. Thank you.

MILTON MUELLER:

I want to say, first, of all to apologize. Other commitments have kept me away from an awful lot of these, the ATLAS sessions and I'll be leaving again in a minute. But it's delightful to see you all here, to see the amount of effort you put into this and I look forward to seeing you all

online and working and if I can help anyone in any of the things that I have some knowledge of, feel free to get hold of me. But it's just marvelous to see the amount of effort that's gone into all of this and I look forward to reaping the benefits of having all of you do the work that I was doing before in the years going forward.

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE:

Okay. Like someone that's so many years here, I do like to share, first of all, I'd like to thank you to Eduardo and Olivier, that was leading us as a small group to put this forward. Thank you. It was a great pleasure to work with them and I do believe that you, like I said, you just keep trying. You know, participate on this like a family. I'm here from 1999. But the added value in my own professional life was something immeasurable. You cannot even think about that.

So never forget that you are doing something for the community, but you are adding a lot of value to yourself. So just keep trying. If you want to go to one, you [bought] something and nobody's listened. Well, ignore. Just keep trying because you're going to be very, very happy to be part of this family in a special ALAC and At-Large as a whole is a real family in your own life. So keep trying. Join our [inaudible]. Everyone that I have the pleasure to work a little bit here. So I'm completely open to help you in any way it's possible and hope to see you around many times. Thank you very much.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE:

Coming from Chad and I am from AFRALO and would like to thank the staff, ALAC staff, ICANN staff, thank you very much. The travel team helped out a lot, enabled us to come here. Thanks to the trainers. We learned a lot as a leader and as an agent of change, we learned a lot with so many new tools. I'm really proud of what we did and we are now ambassadors and we are going to keep working. We are going to share our knowledge with the local community that we have at home and with the end users in our countries and at ICANN. So we're going to share this information and bring new people and more people in the community, At-Large community, so that we can go further. Thank you so much for the opportunity. Together, we'll go farther. Thank you.

[CESAR]:

Cesar [inaudible] to thank the leadership of the ATLAS III training program. Entirely, this is my second ATLAS training I went. I was in ATLAS II in London and this is the third one. But this one, as demonstrated, more important than the previous. I was not at ATLAS I, but ATLAS II, this has shown a great improvement than the previous one. So I say kudos to the planners.

I also recognize the ATLAS III working groups who actually took time and the effort to put together all that was required to make sure that we have today. Even in the course of doing what we're doing, we may have had disagreements but that is a sense of democracy whereby you express your views, and at the end of the day, the majority will have their way, the majority will have their say.

But going forward, I also want to advise that the challenges most of the participants faced by not being present here is very common and ICANN may have done their best, but we also want to appeal to the local hosts at any [inaudible] events that they have to do more than [inaudible] better because it is not for ICANN to move from Silicon Valley to move around with a local host or has agreed to play the role to host, should be able to play the [inaudible] between the various embassies and the participants.

Where they're supposed to [inaudible] more than this, [inaudible] supposed to be able, they cannot be here. But beyond that, I think that what has happened within the last six days is a huge success and I would say, can we give ourselves a good clap offering? Clap for yourselves, everybody.

And lastly, let me appreciate [inaudible]. Yes, he's [inaudible] meaning I cannot believe for those who [inaudible] for seven days. Congratulations and God bless you. Bye.

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE:

Hi. Thanks so much and I also want to give my thanks to Eduardo, Vanda, and Olivier for putting on a great program. And like Daniel and others have said, now that you've gotten all this training and you're revved up and you're excited to work, we're going to be doing a call for the Technology Task Force to get new members and we have a lot of exciting programs to work on, so I look forward to having people wanting to get involved on technology or policy areas or if you wanted to be in the finance and budget, let us know and we're happy to steer

you in any way to any group and explain to you groups that you want to go to.

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: First, thank you for this amazing opportunity in my life. Thank you to the amazing staff and when I attended my first ICANN meeting, like Global Ambassadors in San Juan, Puerto Rico, I never imagined that I would be here today and this community would become so important in my professional life. Thank you.

MOHAMED EL BASHIR: Mohamed El Bashir, outgoing Chair. I think everyone thanked and said very nice appreciation words to everyone. It really has been a pleasure, an honor really, to be part of the community. I'm stepping down and I don't have another role to go to, or at least I'm not planning to. I have made lots of friends, colleagues in the last four or five years, and I think we will continue to be friends. I will be around. And I want to say one thing, beside thanking the leadership, I think you have very incredible staff team. I haven't seen, I was in the ccNSO for some time. I was in the NomCom for some time. I haven't seen such dedicated, awesome staff who really go out of their way. Gisella, Heidi, Evyn, Yeşim, you name it, all of them. They really take it personally. I meant they're always there. When you want to ask something on Skype, the response is just in less than a minute. I don't know what time do they sleep, but you're lucky, really, to have this wonderful group of ladies and [inaudible]. You're breaking the stereotype. So God bless you and I want to see you all/ For the newcomers in our RALO and others. I think it's, there's no checklist

that you can follow. I think just focus on an area that you like to work on, do the hard work and naturally, you will find yourself become a leader. There is no such checklist and we have seen León go up to the level of device Chair of the Board. So there is opportunity there. Just do your part of it. So just do your part of it. So thank you very much, everyone. It was a pleasure.

FATIMATA SEYE-SYLLA:

I'm going to speak in French. I'm Vice President, outgoing of AFRALO And I would like to really agree with the thanks that were given to ICANN staff and for this working group that organized this summit. Congratulations. Excellent work. It was not an easy task, but the result is here and it's great. For those new ambassadors, ATLAS III ambassadors, my message will be ...

Next steps. What will be those next steps? Here we have new contacts being made. We know who can do what, more or less, and I think that all doors can be opened in your respective regions so that you can be coached and do even more. Everything is possible. Everything you can do , you'll be able to do. Start with participating to meetings, asking questions, relevant questions, express your ideas, be open and [inaudible] that you have the staff that is supporting you. Other At-Large members are ready to work with you so that ATLAS III was a full success, not only now but later.

So thank you so much. Congratulations to all. Thank you.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE:

First of all, thank you very much. This is a wonderful opportunity for me to be here from our part of the world, Nepal. It's a developing country and one of my friends here, David, we communicate. We talked yesterday and he told me that what is your takeaway from here?

One of my takeaways here is this networking. This is networking and I told him that we are hosting IEPI] IGF in Nepal. This is the second biggest even in our country. And O have invited lots of leaders from ICANN and also, they have been coming to meet with you. That will only be [inaudible] for support, [EPI] IGF in Nepal. That is one of the takeaways and not so [inaudible] takeaway, I took in our part of the world, I am the push-in for the dinner society. Now I'm [inaudible] past president.

Without ICANN, I am not here. Because of ICANN, I am here. And my contribution to my society, my environment, that's why I am here. So thank you very much entirely, staff, [inaudible], David, our Chair, APRALO Chair and entire my friends. Thank you very much.

MAUREEN HILYARD:

Okay. Thank you. There are so many thank yous and I will add to that. It's been a great week, so thank you to the leadership of At-Large and staff, and David Kolb who has done the training a lot – thank you – and a lot of material that has been concentrated in a short time, so I will certainly go back over slides and reflect on what I've learned. And I look forward to continuing my participation in At-Large and ramping up my participation and [Satisha] and I have already talked a little bit about one activity.

One group I haven't mentioned and we haven't talked about is the health and safety center. That has made me feel comfortable in being here in a potentially icy environment in regard to moving around between the hotel and the conference venue.

So that part of accessibility, which most of you know is my passion, makes me confident in participating and also paves the way in the future for people who might not be so mobile to be able to participate in At-Large and ICANN generally. So thank you very much.

UNIDENTIFIED MALE:

Who is next? Okay, so I'll have to speak in French then. There are no Arabic interpreters in this room. So the participation in ATLAS enabled me to learn more about our friends from the Spanish-speaking friends, and this is a new community, very diverse community, Spanish-speaking community which is great and this is the advisory community. It's fantastic. This diversity is very good and we can communicate all together. We can communicate regarding our technical level. We can communicate, so thank you so much for what you brought to me, for what you taught me during those five days. I'd like to thank Gisella and the staff and I got a lot of support. Thanks to them, I was able to come here. Thank you so much everyone. Thanks to the Spanish-speaking community which was so welcoming. I joined the group. Thank you for your care. Thank you very much.

ROBERTO GAETANO:

I would like to say a few words on what are the thoughts that have been brought to me by attending this meeting. As you know, I have been around for a long time and like everybody who has been around for a long time, I have this attitude that I know already everything. And this meeting was the proof that this is not true.

I enjoyed very much the sessions and learning from other people who I don't know and changing sometimes my mind on things. But I would like to call on you to think about what we have done and what we have to do in the future.

I remember when ALAC was formed. I was one of the first five people, one per region, who was nominated by the NomCom to start. And I remember that we had a gigantic task in front of us. We needed to start recruiting the ALSes. We didn't know how to do it, how to contact and so on, and we started. We have achieved then, the regional organization that were formed only when a certain number of ALSes were created and there was sufficient diversity in the region.

And then from there on, and then ATLAS I, ATLAS II, and now ATLAS III where, for the first time, we had to set a limit to the number of people that will participate because we are really growing fast.

There was also a change in attitude. I remember when I was the first liaison of ALAC to the Board, the attitude of the other Board members that were considering myself and ALAC just a sort of addition to this, a little bit more than [folkloristic] but not really necessary and they were not looking at us as people who could really contribute something. And that has radically changed, and that has not changed because of a

couple of people who were on the Board or so, but because the ALAC has worked hard. And who has attended the session of Brian Cote has learned that ALAC is proposed to be the focal point for one of the sub-processes.

Why? Because ALAC has the recognized capability to do outreach and to bring consensus among the different constituencies. So this is something that is very important and by seeing the diversity that we have in this room, by seeing, by hearing day after day in this short ATLAS III, I think that there is a message that we have to bring back home. We have done a lot, but it's not sufficient. Now the work starts. We need to be stronger and stronger. We have become an important part of the ICANN community and we need to grow more and because we are the only one who can extend the footprint of ALAC. For instance, the registries, the registrars, the ccTLDs, there's a certain number of them. Once you have reached them all, that's done. We have billions of people to reach out to and this is our task as ambassador.

I'm proud to be an ambassador. It comes at a good moment because I've ended my term with a registry and I have a little bit more time to dedicate to ALAC. But I think it's important that we all know that the task starts now.

MAUREEN HILYARD:

Thank you very much, Roberto and I think that that, one of the strengths that we also have is the fact that we've got the Board's support. The fact that we've got León as one of the leaders, Maarten is

very much supportive of our work. So we're actually, I think we've made it there. We've got Humberto and then I think we've got ...

UNIDENTIFIED FEMALE: Sorry, Maureen. It's 29 minutes.

MAUREEN HILYARD: I know, I know, I know, but these two people have been waiting, Humberto and Jonathan and then I have to close the queue because we, I mean, I had actually said we'd go until half-past. Okay?

HUMBERTO CARRASCO: Okay. Very quickly, I'm going to speak in Spanish, please.

I was involved in the ATLAS III Selection Committee and one of the things that caught my eye was that many people who are more experienced and who have more years in ICANN follow the rules that we have set. I mean, as a community, that is a sign of humility which in the good sense of the word, we should not forget humility. It doesn't matter how many years we have been involved in ICANN, we need to keep on following the rules that we are ourselves are setting for the purpose of improve our community.

And let me say this honestly, many people thought that the courses were very basic, but looking at the experience they had, they still took the courses. I'd rather look at a half-full class rather than a half-empty class. If we need to improve constantly, it's because ALAC since its inception, such as Roberto said, has been strongly criticized but as time

went by and the hard work of many of you, of those here, more than myself, we have contributed to this multistakeholder organization. And that is my message. Thank you very much.

JONATHAN ZUCK:

Hi. Thanks again for letting me participate in this. I really enjoyed the breakout sessions and seeing people participate actively. What might be the interesting unspoken aspect of the training that we were all receiving during this meeting is that it's less about our negotiations with other constituencies and more about our negotiations inside the At-Large itself because more than any other constituency in ICANN, we have more cultural diversity, more geographic diversity, more gender diversity. All of that is right here in this microcosm and that's where we need to bring all of these tools to bear to communicate better with each other, to listen to each other and to reach consensus so that we can go back into that community with a single voice.

We have much more work to do than the other constituencies because they begin with a single voice. We bring all of these points of view together and have to find a way toward a consensus and a single voice to take back out into the community and so we will be putting all these tools that we learned over the past few days to use in our own meetings, to make sure that all voices are heard inside the At-Large and inside of the policy development process, etc. so that when we do go out in the hallway, we're able to speak as one. I look forward to working with all of you.

Oh, also, the interpreters are now going to take their 10-minute break and so we will start the next session in ten minutes.

MAUREEN HILYARD: Hear, hear, Jonathan. Well said.
