SITUATION (at a Glance)

- National ICT Policy Development key to Internetbased business development:
 - Varied levels achieved some countries have ICT
 Policies in place
 - Lack of awareness-some are not officially aware of developments in ICT applications
 - Not a priority (in many cases)

■ SITUATION (at a Glance)(continued)

- 2. Human Capacity, Infrastructure and Financial constraints: these issues are common.
- Visibility ICT sector is perceived to be small-scale business ventures therefore interactions with ICANN are limited to a few aspirants (eg. academics, techies and volunteers)

MAIN FACTORS

- Perceptions and changes in business and life styles
- Trust and confidence difficult to carry out business transactions
- Reluctance to invest time and resources in a rapidly changing business environment due to emergence of new applications and technologies
- Regulations (who is actually responsible in the development of the Policy?)

INTERVENTIONS (what is being done?...)

- ccTLD Managers and GAC members are instrumental in informing their respective Govts on Policy Development.
- NGOs are being seen as the best practice in the management of ccTLDs
- Communication Regulation Authorities and Ministries are active in the development of ICT Policies – assumed role in many cases.

INTERVENTIONScontinued..

- Voluntary (Informal) Groups/Individuals are engaged in raising awareness and dissemination of developments that are taking place. Some success stories is some countries is the positive indicator.
- Some Heads of Governments have taken the initiative to promote the development of ICTs in their sub-regions
- e-Government, e-Education, e-Health, and.. e-Everything phenomenon is emerging and raising expectations within the communities.
